


Left: Mr Al-Khalidy's 8MATB class have been engaged in designing and building their dream house using Department of Education virtual reality software Minecraft.

Careers

Year 12, 2020

What an amazing finish to the year! Our Year 12 cohort are to be congratulated on their incredible resilience and dedicated application to study. Thankfully, we were able to hold all our exams onsite, without the need to use any of the alternative arrangements we had prepared in case of an enforced shutdown. We were very impressed with the reasonably calm approach the girls had to each exam – they were well prepared and focused on doing their best.

As predicted, many more university early offers have been made based on students' Year 11 results and School Recommendations. Currently, we have **192 offers for 64 students**!

47 girls have received more than one early offer (in some cases, up to 8 or 9) with only a small proportion of those conditional upon a minimum ATAR – most are theirs simply by completing HSC. Western Sydney and Macquarie Universities continue to offer the majority of places, with other institutions due in the coming months. Currently, our offers tally

Students are reminded to **check the closing dates with UAC for changing preferences** in order to maximise their total offers. Once an offer is officially accepted, the course can be removed from their preference list to make room for another. In late February, students will then be able to choose which course they want to formally enrol in to commence their studies in March.

NB: Make sure all other offers are officially withdrawn/unaccepted so that students are not charged fees for multiple courses.









Year 10

Year 10 All My Own Work workshops will take place on Wednesday 2 December. This is a mandatory course required by the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) prior to commencing Preliminary HSC studies. Students will explore the key principles of good scholarship, including how to avoid plagiarism, acknowledge sources correctly and how to work effectively with others in group tasks. Students who are absent on the day will be given the opportunity to catch up with Ms Heemi on another day before the end of the year.

Congratulations to all participants. All winners won a Dymocks book voucher and a Principal's Gold Award.



Study Skills Newsletter tip for November

When a student says that they have a bad memory, it usually means that actually they do not encode the information they are trying to remember into their memory in an effective way. Memory is really a 'process' as opposed to a 'thing' in your head that you are born with.

Rather than 'improving your memory', you want to improve the process of memory creation to ensure memory retrieval goes smoothly! The reason why many students do not retain what they are learning is that the way they study only gets the information as far as their short term memory, and then before long it is forgotten instead of being encoded into long term memory.

The first stage for students in improving their retention of information is to try and find ways to make what they are learning INTERESTING to themselves, EMOTIONAL, ENJOYABLE and if they can't do this then at least create the firm INTENTION to remember the information. It is all about their approach to what they are learning.

The next step in memory creation is the encoding process. To improve in this area, students need to improve:

- CONCENTRATION AND FOCUS (making notes about what they are learning, studying using techniques that suit their learning style, studying when they are most alert)
- ORGANISATION OF MATERIAL (making brain friendly notes: lists, highlighting, categories, grouping, and graphics)
- MAKING ASSOCIATIONS AND LINKS between the new material and previously learned material.

Next stage in the memory process is facilitating the storage of memories. Students can improve the way memories are stored by ensuring they BREAK THEIR STUDY BLOCKS UP with at least a few minutes break every half hour (giving the brain a chance to encode and file that chunk of content) and CHUNK DOWN the information to be learnt into manageable chunks. Getting enough SLEEP is also essential as fundamental memory processes take place during sleep. The other thing that is really important in this stage is REPETITION AND REGULAR REVIEW. Each time a review takes place the brain fires all the neurons connected to that memory and the more often that happens the stronger the connections between the neurons and the more intense and powerful the memory that is created.

So in summary, the top three things to improve the process of creating powerful memories are:

- Focus, positive attitude and intention to remember are essential (reading something half-heartedly while bored pretty much guarantees it won't be retained)
- ii) An active approach to learning where students are 'doing' (making notes, testing themselves using a wide range of study techniques) rather than just 'reading'
- iii) Repetition and constant review of the material over a period of time.

MAKING ONLINE PAYMENTS

It is now possible for parents to make online payments to the school for amounts owing for students, via a secure payment page hosted by Westpac. Payments can be made using either a Visa, MasterCard, Credit or Debit card, and can be made via computer, tablet or mobile phone. The payment page is accessed from the front page of the schools website by selecting:

"MAKE A PAYMENT" from the taskbar at the top of the page, right hand side.

Items that can be paid include voluntary school contributions, subject contributions, excursions, sales to students and creative and practical arts activities (these include band, drama and dance). There is also a category called 'Other' this to cover items not covered in the previous headings. 'Other' can be used to make a complete payment of a school invoice.

These details are entered each time you make a payment as student information is not held within the payment system.

There is also the option to enter the Student Registration Number and Invoice number if you are aware of them, these are optional fields **OR** there is also the option to enter the Student Registration Number and Invoice number these are not used at our school, please leave blank.

This is a secure payment system hosted by Westpac to ensure that your Credit/Debit card details are captured in a secure manner, these details are not passed back to the school.

When you access the <u>"\$ Make a payment"</u> you must enter:

- the students name, and class and reference number OR
- the students name, and date of birth
