Notes Explaining Illness

Alongside these positive events and achievements, we have been challenged throughout the term with not only covid but the significant impact of the flu, colds and viruses. The absenteeism for students has been high reflecting the health advice that anyone feeling sick should stay home to prevent the spread of germs.

Please remember parents that a note from you explaining that your daughter has been sick on particular days MUST be provided upon the day of her return and handed to Student Services. Alternatively, you may reply to the text message we send you stating your daughter is sick and no other note is then required. This way the absence will go from "unexplained" to "explained". The tally of absences is reflected on the front of each student's report and "explained" absences are more acceptable to a prospective employer or in instances when you need to use your daughter's report as a reference, especially when applying for a scholarship.



Positive Behaviour

Our teachers have also worked incredibly hard to ensure the continuity of learning for our students and provide the broad array of curriculum and co- curriculum events that make for a rich learning environment. They too, have equally been challenged with the array of illnesses as the rest of society. It has been very difficult to engage casual teachers this term and at times we have had to resort to minimal supervision (where two classes are combined) to ensure that all students have a teacher supervising. To this point we have been very lucky to not have to resort to having whole year groups return to online learning. I have spoken to each year group about the importance treating each other, casual and permanent teachers with respect and kindness.

A small number of badly behaved students can have a significant impact on casual teachers' willingness to work in our school and permanent teachers stress levels and wellbeing. As winter sets in, we must work together, teachers, students and parents being patient, respectful and kind so we may navigate the challenges of the cold weather and illnesses of Term 3.

This way our students will be in their classrooms, learning with their teachers and each other, enjoying all that our school has to offer.

Front of School Changes

Exciting news! The improvement to our school's facilities continues. The whole front of our school's groundworks inside the school gates, on Hunter Street, will be replaced by the Department shortly. This includes the front whole teachers' car park and the whole area at the formal entry of the school.

The cracked and uneven bitumen will be replaced with new concrete and an improved drainage system.

In 2023, we will have a large outdoor undercover structure built in the space behind the school sign for events when we host parents and guests and for use in wet weather.

This work will take place during these school holidays and between Weeks 1 to 4 of Term 3. That means that perimeter safety fencing will enclose the whole front of the school and there will be no access from the gates at Hunter Street.



Please see the map on left for the areas affected and the gate for student, staff and parent entry for Weeks 1 to 4 of Term 3.

The **blue tick** is Gate 5 on Braemar Avenue, and the **two red crosses** indicate the closed gates on Hunter Street.

The light blue shaded area is the space where the old bitumen will be replaced. During this time:

- The main entry gates on Hunter Street to the front office at the front of the school and *Student Services* will be closed.
- Access to the school for students, staff and parents will be via Gate 5 on Braemar Avenue.
- Parents MUST make appointments before they come to the school, and a member of staff will open the gates for parents to enter and escort them to the appropriate office.
- Parents will be unable to drop in at the front office without phoning the school first and making an appointment (so an office person can walk to the back of the school and open the gate for you).
- Students will have to enter and leave the school via Gate 5 on Braemar Avenue. You may still drop off and collect your daughter at the front on Hunter Street. It will be a short walk for her to or from the side gate.
- Students MUST not be late because it is impossible for us to know that they are waiting at the side gate. If they are late a call will need to be made to the front office so someone can come and open the gate for them to enter.
- Teachers will need to park on the street.

My apologies for the inconvenience this will cause however it is not possible to move office staff to the back of the school due to space, fixed phone lines and the cost and ability of short-term relocation in the short time frame available. Like all renovations, it is short term inconvenience for longer term improvement.

A letter has been emailed to all parents with this information. Students will be given a letter in Week 10.

Please ring the office for all your needs and our staff will assist you in every way we can. Thank you for your patience and understanding.

Well done to our students for their hard work and engagement with their studies. I am very much looking forward to our Student Recognition Assemblies which will take place very early next term.


9MAT.E – Using Math's Online

Each student has been issued with a username and password. I highly encourage all students during the term 2 holiday to revise and consolidate their learning.






Year 12 Aurora Study Days


The long journey started with the Zone trials, held at Greystanes HS in early February. The Prospect team formed at the Zone trials were majority from the Auburn Girls High School Volleyball team. That same week the Sydney West trials were held, where different regions within the Sydney West area played in a small competition, where the selection for the Sydney West team was taking place. At the end of the day, the team was chosen, where *Cecilia Do* and I were chosen to play for the Sydney West team.

We both attended multiple training sessions after school with my teammates, before heading to the 3-day CHS Championship tournament held in Bomaderry in late March. The competition in Bomaderry was tiring, with about 3 games a day. Unlike the previous year, the Sydney West team played at the top of our game, making our way to the finals, playing against the South Coast Region. Unfortunately, we lost the finals, placing our region second in the state. On the upside, 3 members of the Sydney West team, including myself, were selected to represent the *Combined High Schools NSW team*.

Careers/Transitions

Our current Year 12 have continued their lunchtime information sessions. Ambassadors from various universities have visited the school to give updates on entry programs, course options and scholarship opportunities.

In addition, UAC gave one-hour presentations to each of Year 10, 11 and 12 students to help them better understand HSC and ATAR eligibility for subject selection, the complexities of scaling and, of course, application processes and key dates.

One of the key take-aways from the UAC session was:

- Your HSC **mark** for each course is based on your **performance** in your exam and assessments.
- Your ATAR is a **rank** (not a mark) based on your **position** compared to other students in the state.

This demonstrates why it is important to select subjects you enjoy and will do well in, and why it is imperative you keep striving for excellence all the way up to and including your HSC exams.

UAC applications are now open for Year 12 students, and many have already begun selecting their course preferences. Students have until the end of Term 3 to complete and pay for their applications, and they will be able to change their preferences at key times throughout the rest of this year and early next year to maximise their offers.

Subject books and a dedicated website will be available for all students and parents to view over the winter holidays, and mentors have been appointed from the school Executive made up of Deputy Principals and Head Teachers to help students navigate the process.

More information will be sent out to parents in the coming weeks to help students make the best personal decisions in terms of their pattern of senior study.

Finally, just a reminder that if a student is **absent the day before an assessment** (including Friday if the assessment is scheduled for Monday) or **the day of an assessment**, they must provide a blue Illness Misadventure form to Ms Heemi with a doctor's signed verification on the back.

Medical certificates can be accepted but must give details of the illness and acknowledgement that the student is unfit to complete assessments. A simple statement "*unable to attend school*" is not sufficient evidence for marks to be awarded without penalty. This is to ensure fairness for all students during assessment periods. These forms are available outside the Careers Office, so students can have a couple on hand at home if required.






Parent Information

STUDY SKILLS

Learning something new and challenging can be an uncomfortable process because it takes the learner away from what they know and are familiar with. When learners encounter a new challenge, many are hesitant because they fear making mistakes, revealing a weakness or feeling that they can't succeed.

The Learning Pit is diagram that is designed to encourage and reassure learners that taking risks, asking questions, and trying new things is an essential part of the learning process because learners best develop their skills and deepen their understanding when they are unpacking and experimenting with new concepts and ideas.

Next time your child expresses frustration with learning something new, direct them to The Learning Pit and ask them to identify where they are currently at in the learning process. If the emotion your child expresses is not on The Learning Pit diagram, add it to the diagram. Once they know where they are, help them map out strategies they will use to help overcome the obstacles they are currently experiencing so that they can achieve their learning goals.



MAKING ONLINE PAYMENTS

It is now possible for parents to make online payments to the school for amounts owing for students, via a secure payment page hosted by Westpac. Payments can be made using either a Visa, MasterCard, Credit or Debit card, and can be made via computer, tablet or mobile phone. The payment page is accessed from the front page of the school's website by selecting:

'MAKE A PAYMENT'' from the taskbar at the top of the page, right hand side.

Items that can be paid include voluntary school contributions, subject contributions, excursions, sales to students and creative and practical arts activities (these include band, drama and dance). There is also a category called 'Other' this to cover items not covered in the previous headings. 'Other' can be used to make a complete payment of a school invoice.

These details are entered each time you make a payment as student information is not held within the payment system.

There is also the option to enter the Student Registration Number and Invoice number if you are aware of them, these are optional fields **OR** there is also the option to enter the Student Registration Number and Invoice number these are not used at our school, please leave blank.

This is a secure payment system hosted by Westpac to ensure that your Credit/Debit card details are captured in a secure manner, these details are not passed back to the school.
