

Dear Year 12 Student,

My name is Margaret Beazley and one of my roles as Governor of New South Wales is to connect to the broad and diverse community of our State. At the moment, as you do your final preparation and study for your HSC exams, you are very much on my mind.

Year 12 is always a challenging year for every student sitting the HSC. There are the constant assessments and exams. There is the worry about marks and what the best path will be for you to take as you move beyond school.

When, at the end of 2020 and into 2021, you commenced your final two years of school, you were still very much impacted by the restrictions of COVID-19 and the disruption that caused to your studies and to your sporting and social life. It is hard to think of a generation so impacted in that way.

Student Code of Conduct


As you may be aware, we are constantly striving to improve our school.

Mathematics

Exciting things have taken place this term in our math classrooms. Year 12 have successfully sat their Trial Higher School Certificate Examination and stage 5 students have engaged in various investigation tasks involving mathematical ideas and knowledge.

Surface Area and Volume of Solids

Year 9 explored the surface area and volume of three-dimensional solids using their nets. Students had to measure, cut out the nets and thread the strings to create pop-ups.

These assessments will be on display in our classrooms (rooms 204 and 205).

This added value to our students learning as it allowed them to visualise and construct by hand the 3D model of common solids. It was a great success!



Probability and Games

Year 10 engaged in a practical task using their knowledge, understanding and skills of probability.

The aim of the task was to apply mathematics to practical situations and create a board game that incorporates based on chance and probability.

They worked in groups to design and test out their games.





Year 12 Trials and HSC

Year 12 students have successfully completed their Trial Higher School Certificate Examination.

This year our school has offered all levels of Mathematics including Mathematics Extension one and two.

Year 12 are recommended to make the most of their time leading to the HSC by asking their teachers for resources, visiting the NESA Past HSC Papers and sitting Mock HSC papers.





After School Mathematics Tutoring

There has been high interest in our After-School Mathematics tutoring program which is run every Monday from 3:15-4:15 pm. We offer highly experienced university students to come and assist students with their homework and classwork.

Female Mathematicians


Each term we will be exploring notable female mathematicians that have contributed to Mathematics over time.

Name: Dame Mary Lucy Cartwright, 1900-1998

What she did: Mary Cartwright was a British mathematician and a woman of many firsts! She was not only the first woman to obtain a first in her university degree, but also one of the first mathematicians to study what is now known as chaos theory. She was the first woman to receive the Sylvester Medal (awarded for the encouragement of mathematical research), the first woman to be President of the Mathematical Association and the first woman to be President of the London Mathematical Society.



Mary's impact: Thanks to her bravery in daring to defy the status quo, her work has gone on to strongly influence the modern theory of dynamical systems, and she even has a mathematical theorem named after her! *Written by Ms. Mani*






Science

Whether they are designing roads, nanoparticles, space craft, or improving the technology in your home, engineers use the Engineering Design Process every day to figure out what problems to solve and how to make decisions. The Engineering Design Process is also at the heart of our Year 9 and 10 iSTEM project-based elective course.

We were lucky enough to be chosen as one of six schools to take part Engineers Australia in "Discover Engineer" Day. Not only did our Year 10 and 11 students get to spend the day collaborating to design, build and test aircraft and wind turbines, we were extremely excited to welcome seven engineers from different organisations into our classroom. 

Our lovely Year 12 girls are reaching the end of their school journey and are already turning their thoughts to the next step. UAC applications are in, and SRS (School Recommendation Scheme) data is being collated by Ms. Heemi and Ms. Diamond ready for processing.

Currently, 32 students have received 68 early offers to university based on their Year 11 results and/or their leadership and community involvement. This will relieve a lot of the stress in the lead up to HSC exams. Of course, they still need to perform to the best of their ability so they can continue to collect offers over the coming months, but it is wonderful to see their hard work last year paying off.

Last month all Year 10 students went through the process of selecting their subjects for senior study. It was pleasing to see many girls take the decision-making process seriously – actively participating in Careers lessons to gather information, listening to the advice of their mentors and seeking further clarification from teachers and students involved in the subjects. Final subjects will be confirmed in Term 4.

We have been fortunate to be selected as a pilot school for Western Sydney University's Academy U program this year. Up to ten students were selected from each year level (Year 9–11) to participate based on their expressions of interest and their current application to study and academic progress. These girls are able to access online modules to build their preparation for tertiary study, attend face-to-face workshops with lecturers from WSU, culminating in the Year 11 group completing a first-year university unit – Leadership in Complexity. In Week 6 of Term 3 the library celebrated Book Week with the theme '*Dreaming with eyes open*'.




Local MP visits for Book Week

On the 22^{nd of} August 2022 local state MP for the NSW Parliament for the electorate of Auburn, Ms. Lynda Voltz, visited and addressed four classes over two hours. As well as bringing a number of books as gifts for the library, Ms. Voltz brought her impressive knowledge of literature and history and amazed the students and staff with her recitals of poetry and Shakespeare. She made McBeth easy to understand by explaining that it is a mistake to believe gossip. Observing the students, I was struck by how intently they listened, and they reminded me of meerkats on a hillside with their curious eyes, taking in all that Ms Voltz had to say.



Ms Voltz encouraged the students, saying: follow your career dreams; we are all Australian and we all have families who came from somewhere else; be strong and independent; read and especially read the classics because there you can, for example in 'The Call of the Wild' by Jack London, learn how cruel humans really can be - and you can choose not to be cruel or to be a bystander if you see bullying; and books have *the whole story* while movies can just have bits of the story and can even change the story.

She explained that a young family member overcomes her anxiety by reading *The Little Prince* by Antoine de Saint-Exupéry because she feels the writer understands her and the book speaks to her better than do adults – something that is commonly experienced by children who read. We all give a huge thanks to Ms. Voltz from AGHS staff and





students for inspiring us all during Book Week and for supporting our school!

MAKING ONLINE PAYMENTS

Parents/Carers can make online payments to the school for amounts owing for students, via a secure payment page hosted by Westpac. Payments can be made using either a Visa, MasterCard, Credit or Debit card, and can be made via computer, tablet, or mobile phone.

The payment page is accessed from the front page of the school's website <u>https://auburng-h.schools.nsw.gov.au/</u> by selecting:

'MAKE A PAYMENT'' from the taskbar at the top of the page, right hand side.

Items that can be paid include voluntary school contributions, subject contributions, excursions, sales to students and creative and practical arts activities (these include band, drama, and dance). There is also a category called 'Other' this to cover items not covered in the previous headings. 'Other' can be used to make a complete payment of a school invoice. These details are entered each time you make a payment as student information is not held within the payment system.

There is also the option to enter the Student Registration Number and Invoice number if you are aware of them, these are optional fields **OR** there is also the option to enter the Student Registration Number and Invoice number these are not used at our school, please leave blank.

This is a secure payment system hosted by Westpac to ensure that your Credit/Debit card details are captured in a secure manner, these details are not passed back to the school.

For any enquiries regarding the Online Payment process please contact the School Administration Office.

When you access the <u>"\$ Make a payment"</u> you must enter:

- the students name, and class and reference number OR
- the students name, and date of birth
